The Role of the Speaker

 In every parliament, whether
 Westminster or presidential, there is a person who takes on the role of a Speaker, or presiding officer.

 In the Westminster system of Parliament, this role is effectively known as the Speaker of Parliament

Roles of the Speaker

- The key role of the Speaker is to impartially oversee the procedures of debate in Parliament.
- As per the rules of the Parliament, the Speaker is seen as an impartial authority conducting the proceedings of the House
- The Speaker basically maintains the order and authority of all undertakings of the Parliament as its Presiding Officer.

Functions of the Speaker

- Allow Members who are speaking to express their views
 Ensure that Members adhere to the rules of the debate, that is, as required by the Standing Orders of the House
- Regulates the time allocated for debate and ensure that parliamentary time is not wasted
- Provide ruling on any dispute as to the procedure to be followed by the House
 Protect the rights and interests of every member of the House as per the Rules

Role of Members of Parliament

Summarised under three key areas:

MPs as Representatives

• MPs as Legislators

• MPs as Scrutinizers

MP's as Representatives

 MP's are representatives of the people who elect them
 MP's are required to exercise their judgement to support motions and other Bills in Parliament in the interest of their

people

 Meet their constituencies commitments by regular meetings

MP's as Legislators

- Most visible and critical role that MP's are expected to play is legislating, or in other words, law-making
- Law-making is also one of the areas in which MP's are ill-equipped with most of the times
- MP's must always remember to be transparent and accountable during the law-making

MP's as Scrutinizers

Backbench MP's have several opportunities to help people achieve their desire for effective, accountable government • Well informed MP's can support or scrutinize draft legislations • MP's undertake this role usually in the House or in Parliamentary Committees • As scrutinizers, MP's are able to examine whether the government has correctly used the public funds
